



Table Grape Varieties

Grapes

There are multiple varieties of table grapes to choose from depending on when they ripen and the flavor that is desired.

Variety	Description
CONCORD	Blue grape which ripens late in the season, often late September. Originally developed in Concord, Massachusetts and introduced in 1843. Vigorous, very productive vines produce medium to large size clusters of fruit. Useful for fresh eating, jelly, juice, or wine. Full Sun. Deciduous.
SUFFOLK RED	Suffolk Red produces medium to large clusters of mild-flavored seedless red berries that ripen in September, two weeks before Concord. Typically grows 15'-20' in height. Propagation by cuttings.
FLAME	Early ripening red seedless grape. America's most popular supermarket grape. Mild sweet flavor. Good vigor and productivity.
VANESSA	Deep red medium size oval shaped seedless grapes. Early ripener. The flavor is mild and fruity, and berry texture is firm. The fruit quality is among the best of the red seedless types. Grows well even in the coldest zones, makes an excellent investment for frigid winters. USDA Zones 5-8.
RELIANCE	Early maturing dark purple fruit is excellent for jams, jellies, and raisins. Mild, sweet, fruity flavor. Self-pollinating.

THOMPSON	Small, sweet, mild-flavored, seedless, green grapes. Ripens mid-season.
NEPTUNE	Large very showy clusters of medium yellow-green seedless berries ripen mid-season. Firm berries with thick skin, resistant to cracking. Cold hardy. Makes for a beautiful addition for centerpieces and fruit baskets. Grows 5'-7' tall and spreads 6'8'. USDA Zones 5-8. Propagation by dormant cuttings.

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
