



Blueberry Varieties

Blueberries

The small, round, indigo-to-black berries of *Vaccinium* genus are packed with antioxidants, fiber, and vitamin C and K. Blueberry perennial shrubs are primarily native to North America, are deciduous with oval leaves and bell-shaped white/pink flowers. Many varieties serve ornamental purposes with vibrant colored leaves in the fall, and some are semi-evergreen. Blueberries love acidic soil and full sun.

Blueberry varieties are categorized into types - Northern Highbush (cold-hardy), Southern Highbush (heat-tolerant), Lowbush (dwarf), and Half-high (hybrid).

The lists below represent what was ordered or grown for 2026. If you'd like to check on current availability of a particular variety, please check with a store associate.

Varieties	Description
Blue Jay	Light blue fruit, one of the best for freezing, canning. Fruit maintains well on bush. Early-Mid season. Yellow orange fall foliage.
Bluecrop	Mid-season harvest. Considered the best all-around variety for consistently heavy yields of high-quality fruit. The berry is larger than average, light blue, and extremely flavorful. The upright open bush grows to 4-6 feet.
Blueray	Blue foliage. Pink-blushed flowers produce a large crop of large, sweet, juicy berries on a compact, mounded shrub. Perfect for massing in the landscape or featuring in large tubs.

Chandler	'Chandler' is a highbush blueberry cultivar which typically grows 5-6' tall and features perhaps the largest blueberries produced by any highbush cultivar available.
Chippewa	An excellent choice for container growing. Sky blue fruit mid to late season, is largest berry of the half-highs. Developed in Minnesota. Red fall foliage.
Duke	A semi-evergreen Northern Highbush variety cultivated specifically to flourish in northern regions. A reliable, consistent, heavy producing variety that blooms late but ripens early, protecting blossoms from late frosts. USDA Zones 5-8.
Earliblue	A premier early-season, northern highbush known for producing large, firm, and light-blue berries with a sweet flavor. Vigorous, upright, and cold-hardy, reaching 2-6ft tall. Excellent for fresh eating, baking, and freezing.
Elliot	Large crops of good size very late season, fruit often into September. Tangy fruit needs to fully ripen on bush. Red orange fall foliage.
Jersey	One of the oldest and most widely grown varieties. Reliable, vigorous, and heavy yielding. Exceptionally sweet and complex "classic" flavor. Great for baking with firm, crack-resistant berries. Late-season variety.
Jewel	Popular early-to midseason Southern Highbush cultivar known for producing exceptionally large, firm, and flavorful balanced sweet-tart berries. Vigorous with upright growth, partially evergreen, and heavy yielding. Partially self-fertile.
Legacy	Upright, vigorous, productive perennial Northern highbush plants with a moderate growth rate. This bush has glossy green foliage that changes to orange in the fall. The plant also retains most of its leaves throughout the winter season. Growers can expect yields from 8-20 pounds per bush if properly maintained. Low-chill hours 800-1,000. Grows 4'-6' tall with a spread of 3'-4'. USDA Zones 4-8.

Nocturne	Produces sweet, medium-sized, dusky-black berries. Prized for its ornamental value, and features a contrast of vivid red-orange immature fruit. 5-6ft tall, vigorous and upright bush. Late-season harvest.
Northblue	Hardy, "half high" (3ft) hybrid. Great for cold climates. Yields 3-9lbs of large, sweet, dark blue berries in mid-summer. Glossy green foliage turns red in fall. Self-pollinating. "Wild" flavor, firm texture.
Northcountry	Great patio pot variety. Bears classic wild blueberry flavored berries in early mid-season. Red scarlet fall foliage.
Patriot	This highbush blueberry cultivar has large, tart berries that ripen early on in the season and is known for delivering large consistent crops. It is self-pollinating, but planting another highbush variety nearby will increase yields. Requires acidic soil and good drainage. Mature it grows to 4'-6' and a width of 4'-5'. USDA Zones 3-7, propagation by hardwood cuttings.
Polaris	An early season companion to Chippewa. Delicate sweet medium sized fruit. Fresh eating. Red fall foliage.
Razz	A midseason-ripening, highbush blueberry with unique raspberry overtones. Plump, powdery blue fruits. Excellent for eating fresh, and for culinary uses. Blooms March - April, ripening in July.
Spartan	Tasty fruit often larger than a quarter in size with a tangy sweet flavor. Ripens mid-July. Large, glossy-green foliage becomes orange and yellow in fall. Small white, bell-shaped flowers proceed the berries. Deciduous.
Sweet Heart	Northern-Southern cross produces two crops of blueberries in mild climates- one in summer and a smaller crop in fall. Big, firm, juicy berries.

Top Hat	Perfect name as it grows only 1ft - 2ft high and wide. White blooms in spring give way to attractive light blueberries that are pea sized and larger. Nice in patio containers or in garden.
Toro	Large, mildly sweet, mid-season fruit. Excellent ornamental qualities for the landscape. Bright red fall foliage.

BerryBux®	A revolutionary ornamental blueberry with landscape appeal and superior performance. Its attractive foliage and dense, compact habit make it ideal for hedges and mass plantings. Add in delicious, colorful berries, and you have a perfectly impressive product.
Jelly Bean®	Jelly Bean® has large, flavorful blueberries that taste like homemade, sweet blueberry jelly. The unique, elongated foliage is typically green with highlights of red in cooler climates.
Midnight Cascade®	White, bell-shaped flowers in the spring lead to an abundant summer crop of blueberries. The ripe fruit is packed with aromatic flavors and antioxidants. Green foliage has hints of red that will darken in cooler fall weather. The low, cascading habit works great as a groundcover and for trailing over walls in the landscape.
Peach Sorbet®	A compact blueberry plant with stunning peach, pink, orange, and emerald green leaves. White, bell-shaped flowers appear in spring, leading to an abundant summer

	crop of blueberries. In most climates, this plant will keep its leaves throughout winter and turn a rich eggplant purple
Pink Icing®	Pink Icing® has breathtaking foliage colors and large, robustly flavored berries. In spring, the foliage has many shades of pink, mixed with blue and deep greens, turning a stunning iridescent turquoise-blue in winter. Plant this variety for year-round color and beauty.
Sapphire Cascade®	Hang this plant next to your colorful annuals for a beautiful and delicious combination. Clusters of sweet blueberries will cover the plants throughout the season, and the leaves will turn deep red and green in the winter months. The low, cascading habit works great as a groundcover and for trailing over walls in the landscape.
Silver Dollar®	A unique blueberry that has foliage resembling Eucalyptus! White flowers in the spring lead to a summer crop of large blueberries. Foliage will have hints of silver throughout the spring and early summer before turning emerald green in the fall.
